


Why Collaborations Are Necessary - Victim safety - Services for victims - Offender accountability - Community support - No one agency/entity has all the resource necessary to protect victims and hold offenders accountable


Victim Safety

Offender Accountability


- □ Criminal Justice System Response
 - Law Enforcement, Prosecutors, Judges, Corrections, Probation/Parole
- □ Tribal Law and Order Act Sec. 602. Domestic & Sexual Violence Training
 - Requires BIA-OJS to develop trainings for BIA/tribal officers to improve survivor/witness interviews and evidence collection and preservation
- □ Tribal Codes


Community Support - For victims - For efforts to hold offenders accountable - Commitment to take stalking seriously - Awareness
