
#### **Cultural Considerations At Crime Scenes**




### **Autopsy Issues**

When a death is investigated as a criminal act, the standard progression of sequential cultural and spiritual events in Native communities is delayed by the necessity of an autopsy which is viewed as a postmortem invasion of a loved one's body and certain traditional beliefs are that when a person's body is marked and mutilated by an autopsy, that is how the deceased enters the Spirit World.




### **Burial Delays**

Many tribal cultures have a certain time frame between death and burial and also have spiritual beliefs about the body of the deceased.







In order to develop cultural responses to violent crime and violent death in Indian Country we must not only understand the American Indian and Alaska Native cultures but also understand that each tribal community is different. Native communities are very distinct from one another, yet they share a common relationship with the local, state and federal government as they navigate a modern world of cultural diversity.



- \*Use compassion and sensitivity in delivering death notifications
- \*Be prepared with accurate information such as time of death, cause of death, but use caution in compromising investigation
- \*Avoid delivering death notifications by phone if at all possible. When delivering in person, don't leave the survivor alone.
- \*Delivering this life altering news in the most compassionate manner has a tremendous impact on how survivors move on and done insensitively can delay the cultural healing process

# Victims I hat Explain What's Next...

Contact with Cold Case Victims (Example from VAU handout):

Here are some helpful things to do when your case becomes active again:

- 1. Start gathering a support system around you. Strong emotions may surface. You may feel the need to express them and talk about how you feel. It is important to have friends and family around who can listen to you.
- 2. Have a support person start notifying the people who need to know if you are not up to it.

Police searched the DNA/ database for a profile of a relative and located the son Lonnie David Frankin Jr.



Franklin is tied to 16 homicides and 1 attempted murder. He s charged with 10 murders and the attempted murder. He has plead not guilty.

On December 16, 2010, the Los Angeles Police Department released 180 photos of women found in Franklin's home. Police officials released the images after unsuccessful attempts to identify the individuals, possibly additional victims.

Investigators found over 1,000 photos and several hundred hours of video of women in Franklin's home.





# POSTCONVICTION DNA TIESTING


- Over 5,000 qualifying cases reviewed
- Created efficient system for post-conviction review
- Locating and determining the condition of evidence in cases early on
- Not holding defendants accountable for the actions of their trial attorneys
- · Instituting a defendant initiated application process.





Roughly 9200 qualifying inmates have met with a prison case manager.


The JRP II model exceeds the protections the Colorado Victims' Rights Act provides.

JRP II covers all "violent felony cases." This includes Murder (1st and 2nd), Assault (1st and 2nd), Kidnapping (1st and 2nd), Aggravated Robbery, Arson (1st), Burglary (1st), Sexual Assault, and Sexual Assault on a Child (only if the child was a stranger to the defendant).



















































What's the message we are sending with DNA and real partnerships?
