Understanding and Valuing Culture

- Evidence-based paradigm
 - Need for data for funding applications
 - Evaluation requirements for funding
- Not always appropriate to evaluate cultural practices using standard Western approaches



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Potential Solution: Tribal Programs and Practices

- Development of a system or set of criteria to understand the effects of cultural practices and programs on various outcomes in a way that:
 - Respects the cultural practice itself
 - Respects tribal sovereignty
- Benefits
 - Help tribes understand benefits of culture for their citizens
 - Provide much needed data for future funding



Framing Questions

- 1. To what extent does the current "evidence-based" paradigm influence your program and practice choices?
- 2. How does the need for existing data or a program evaluation plan influence your decision to pursue funding opportunities?
- 3. What types of information would be okay to gather in order to better understand the effects of traditional cultural programs and practices on outcomes related to crime and justice?
- 4. How should this information be collected?

- 6. How should this information be used?
- 7. Which alternative approaches might NIJ consider when it comes to researching and evaluating programs and practices?
