You are a DV advocate that helped her find temporary housing to escape her situation, and now she is asking for your assistance again.



## Input from our Tribal Stakeholders

- AI/AN survivors need access to services throughout their life course.
- Ensure the tool is **USER FRIENDLY** and **SAFE** for victims and service providers.
- Ensure the tool is **ACCESSIBLE** to AI/AN living in remote locations or living with disabilities.
- For some things, providing a **REFERRAL SOURCE** rather than a direct link to a service may be preferred.
- Important to work with Tribal Coalitions to gather information on existing services.
- Create an efficient system for keeping the tool **UPDATED**.

## Ways to use the tool in practice

- Sharing a palm card or the website with existing clients for future reference
- Use the tool with a victim so they feel comfortable conducting searched for themselves or others
- Provide palm card to members of the community before a crime occurs at outreach events
- Share and train tribal and local law enforcement on the tool so that victims know they options after a crime
- Reach out to area agencies to create and expand coalitions and mutual referral protocols
- Use to provide a gaps analysis of area agencies
- Link to the tool from your website or requests service you receive outside of your own area
