Over two days, three briefing sessions will be held. Each session will contain the same information and speakers to accommodate varying schedules. The Bureau of Justice Assistance (BJA), Office of Justice Programs, U.S. Department of Justice, in partnership with the Center for Evidence-based Policy at Oregon Health and Sciences University, is hosting three briefing sessions to highlight a new and rapidly expanding criminal justice alternative — joint jurisdiction courts. The briefing sessions will be held on November 1 at the Office of Justice Programs and Bureau of Indian Affairs and on November 2 at the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services. Joint jurisdiction courts are partnerships between tribal courts and their local, state, or federal partners. In many of these courts, tribal and non-tribal judges share the bench and work together to improve justice outcomes in the community; other non-judicial partnerships employ agreements to better address the needs of the community and offenders/ex-offenders or inmates. There are now seven joint jurisdiction wellness courts in operation and others in the planning process.

Each briefing session will include presentations from tribal and state court judges and law enforcement personnel and a wellness court graduate. The initial evaluations of these courts have identified cost savings and positive outcomes for clients as well as notable improvement in relationships and communication between members of the tribal and nontribal communities.

Who should attend: Federal agencies and congressional staff members, training and technical assistance providers and national organizations who work with drug courts and wellness courts, and Indian tribes and tribal organizations are welcomed.

Briefing sessions: The agenda is the same for each briefing session. The briefing sessions will be held at different locations to accommodate varying schedules of attendees.
